

Engaging the Community: Where do Start?

WHERE DO WE START?





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Introduction

Experience has shown us that the creative Bible studies can be truly motivational and can provide the energy for church members to want to be active in their community and make a difference.

But that same experience has also revealed that this is not straightforward. Often people don't know how to start – how to make those important links that can be built on and eventually become a way of life. So here are just a few ideas for engaging with the community, starting small and realising that every connection, however small is a seed that is planted and can grow and flourish.



1. Join in with what is already going on

Find out what is already going in in the community, particularly things that you enjoy or feel strongly about. Find out what matters to people by attending residents association meetings and make sure the church is represented in any community campaigns, particularly those that involve addressing the needs of the most vulnerable.

Also, look at the church projects you are already involved with. Are there ways these projects could be improved to be more owned/led by the community? There are two other supplementary resources on the website that help us to think about these things, *Building on what we have* and *Turf and Terms*.



2. Community conversations

We live in a very individualistic, materialistic society where people tend to look out for number one. Also, with so much use of texting, messaging and emailing, we are talking to each other less and less. More than ever, it is important to take the time as individuals and a church to talk to people. Make the most of every opportunity, whether it's at the checkout or taking the dog for a walk.

To help with this it would be good to remind yourselves of the listening skills found in Module 3 of 'Stories on the Street'. Also two resources on the website that revolve around having conversations are *Strangers to Neighbours* and *the Power of the Story*.



3. Start small projects

Based on the information you have gathered using some of the tools in 'Stories on the Street', such as mapping and the hot air balloon, start a small project that people have a passion for and which makes the most of the resources you have available. See the supplementary resources, Crossing the River (a mime with a message) and The Big Idea which is a fun activity that helps us think about how to use the resources we have creatively.
